Which comes first?

... government or economics?

High schoolers are required to take a semester each of American government and macro-economics. The question has arisen as to which subject should be taught first: government or economics?

Because the combo title is normally listed as "Government *and* Economics," most will quite naturally teach government first, then economics practically as an after-thought. That order is backwards.

In the *Financial Fitness* materials which I highly recommend for Personal Finance (which is *micro*-economics), chapter twenty-one in the textbook is titled, "The First Three Great Economic Questions."

While the author continues to cover five questions which must be asked and answered in every society, I want to bring your attention to these two:

Q #1: How will people get the necessities of life? Q #2: Who will rule?

Under Q #1, the author covers barter, command and market economies, as well as property rights and specialization.

It is under Q #2 that the author states,

Every government eventually seeks to increase its power, and the rulers in every economic arrangement eventually try to more toward a command economy — with themselves in charge.

Note that the first great question (how will people get the necessities of life?) is the foundation of economics, and the second (who will rule?) is the basis of government. Thus, economics is naturally primary, and politics is secondary.
